Getting support to make choices

You have the right to make choices about your health.

There are four steps to making a choice.

You must:

1. Understand the information.
2. Understand your choices.
3. Think about what will happen with each choice.
4. Make your choice.

Sometimes, you can do these 4 things by yourself.

Other times, you may need help to do some of the things on the list.

Supported decision making is when someone helps you understand and think about your choices.
